Pledge information: Here is just a little information that you may not be aware of. If you made a pledge and only donate once a month or once every two weeks it is not necessary for you to include all the envelopes for that month; you may put your entire donation for two weeks, one month or however many donations you would like to make at one time on one check or place the cash in ONE envelope and discard the rest of the envelopes for that period of time. DO NOT write one check for both pledges. The money for the Building Fund goes into a different account than the money for the Operating Fund. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit. Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

Glory to you, Lord Christ

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Sunday, January 17

Ephesians 4:1-16 *I, therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you to walk worthy of the calling with which you were called, with all lowliness and gentleness, with longsuffering, bearing with one another in love.* (vv.1-2 NKJV)

How many callings do you feel on your life? A calling isn't just about a ministry. So many times we think of callings only in those terms and forget about all the other areas God calls us to.

I am single today but feel a possible calling to be a husband and stepfather to a wonderful woman and her two children. That is an important calling. Daily I feel God pushing in on me to be a better brother to my siblings or a more supportive friend. As a recovering alcoholic of 16 years, I feel called to help others as God places them in my life. Currently I am struggling with a neighbor and hear God's voice calling me to be more longsuffering. We are the hands and feet of God to all those around us. That is a big calling.

Genesis 8:6-22 *"While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, winter and summer, and day and night shall not cease."* (v.22)

God uses Noah and the ark to start His principle of the seed. Look back on your life and see how the principle works. For me it took the poor choice of alcohol for years to finally bring me to the cross. There, by accepting Christ as my Savior, I planted a good seed. Wonderful change, transformation, and growth occurred because of that seed of faith. I was an agriculture major in college and one principle I remember: You can't plant lima beans and expect to get lush corn during the harvest. The same applies to our lives. If we daily plant impure thoughts and bad choices we can't expect to see a Godly harvest. What seeds did you plant yesterday? I know I

have those days where almost everything needs to be plowed back under to start again. Only you pick the seeds. God gives us a free choice on the matter.

In the story Ham rushes from the tent to point out his father's sin to his two brothers, Sham and Japheth. I too can be so quick to report others' bad behavior while lifting myself up. At times I am Ham the finger

pointer or maybe the brooding, older brother in the Prodigal Son story. But the two other sons of Noah, out of respect for their father, back into the tent with a garment to cover their father. They honored their father and were later blessed through their descendants. God has shown me my tongue can be so quick to take others down a notch. I need to be more forgiving, respectful, and patient, knowing my own flaws shine brightly at times.

Jesus has just talked to the Samaritan woman about a fountain of water springing up into everlasting life and she is interested. Aren't we all interested when hearing about God's living water at those times in our lives that are so dusty and dry? I finally came to God's well after messing my life up through alcoholism. Many come to the well after a financial collapse or a failed marriage. We show up desperate and thirsty, finally needing God. We can't do it on our own anymore. The key question is when the bank account is full again or the marriage thriving, do we stay close to God's well or do we drift away again? Do we still show up everyday to drink and praise God or only for a few hours on Sunday? Lord, keep me close with the rope and bucket in my hand.

The Lord speaks to all of us in different ways. Moses saw a burning bush, but that doesn't mean I need to campout next to a bushy area. God wants a daily relationship so we can know His ways. He speaks to each of us uniquely if we are listening. Sometimes I sense the Lord using a friend through conversation or counsel. It might be wisdom from Proverbs or the Psalms, or perhaps a sermon, worship song, quiet time, or prayer. God can use any form He wants and we need to but listen for His urgings and gentle instruction. Spend time in His presence and you will learn His will for your life.

I am sure God has blessed you too in areas like health, family, work, or maybe a wonderful spouse. Would your friends and neighbors see a joy about your life because of your relationship with God? Would a stranger on a plane be drawn to ask about your story because he saw something different about you? For years I was quiet and I'm sure God understood as I grew in my faith. But He must love seeing His kids grow up and sing praises about their Abba.
